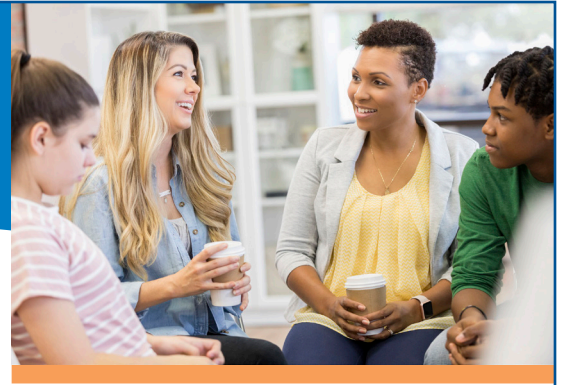


# SP<sup>3</sup> - Student Planning Pointers for Parents



## Conversation Starters

### Course Planning Begins Before High School Does – 8th Grade

You know your student the best, so the following talking points are simply a guideline to use in starting a conversation with your 8th grader about planning high school courses.
