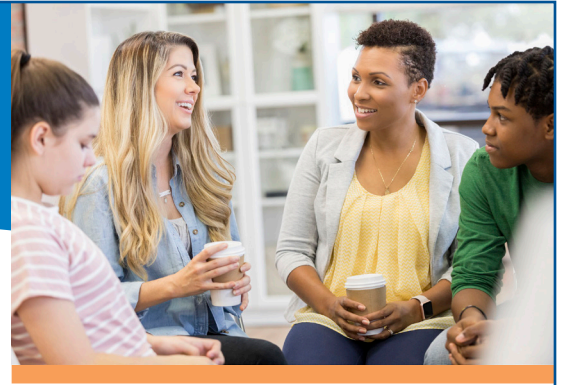

Conversation Starters

Staying Focused and on Track Pays Off – 11th Grade

You know your student the best, so the following talking points are simply a guideline to use in starting a conversation with your 11th grader that now is the time to discuss that the 11th grade year is not the time for complacency.
