Conversation Starters

Parent-Teacher Conferences – 9th Grade

You know your student the best, so the following talking points are simply a guideline to use in starting a conversation with your 9th grader about parent-teacher conferences.

These are some suggested talking points for a conversation with your student to use at your discretion.

Suggest that your student attend conferences with you and encourage him/her to ask questions. This will help your student develop effective and positive communication skills with adults.

Beforehand, consider asking your student the following questions:

- In what classes are you doing well?
- Is there anything you want to tell me about before I hear it from your teacher(s)?
- > If you are getting a grade lower than our expectation, do you have a plan to improve your grade and if yes, what is it?
- > Are there any classes where you and your teacher don't have a positive working relationship?
- > Are there any classes where you don't understand what your teacher's expectations are?
- > Are there any classes where you don't understand the material?

During conferences, consider asking the following questions of your student's teachers:

- How is my student performing?
- What are your suggestions if improvement is needed?
- Are there resources outside of class that we could utilize?
- This is what my student is telling me, what is your perspective?
- Are there any negative or inappropriate behaviors we should address?
- I know it's early in the school year, but since my student is planning for (college/career) after high school, do you feel my student is on the right track?





After conferences, consider discussing the following with your student:

- > If your student wasn't present at conferences, share information about your interactions with teachers.
- Emphasize the positive comments you heard and commend your student's achievements.
- > If improvement or changes were recommended, discuss an agreed-upon plan or direction for your student.
- Set goals and checkpoint dates for the plan and create a triangle of communication between you, your student and teachers.
